News Update

Over the last three years there has been much speculation by economists on the future of the dollar. Most analysts forecasted a decline in value, but that has simply <u>not</u>

materialized. Early last year the Sterling exchange rate was heading towards 1.95, but at present, the rate stands at 1.77 - taking ten percent off the cost of a trip to Great Britain, as compared with last year. Similar shifts in relative values have occurred with the Euro, which helps to make Ireland a less expensive destination. Additionally, many hotels and golf clubs

have held prices over the last couple of seasons, which means your dollar goes even further!

With the airline industry slowly settling down after the unforgettable

events of September 2001, airfares are also becoming more competitive in price. With these factors behind us, there is a substantial increase in bookings for the coming season,



which all tour operators and hoteliers are reporting. Of course, the **Ryder Cup** explains to some degree the huge interest in Ireland this summer. Equally, the return to **Hoylake** (Royal Liverpool) for the **Open Championship** - the first time since 1967 - will give an enormous boost to golf in England's northwest.

The Links Cup Amateur

Invitational returns to Sea Island, Georgia in October after a very successful first visit to Gleneagles in Scotland, which took place this past September. The event was won by the Redtail team from Ontario, Canada after an exciting playoff with Piping Rock. It was Saucon Valley and Pine Valley who finished one shot further back, in one of

the tightest finishes ever. In the ladies event, the Links Team triumphed after another close contest. All competitors enjoyed the golf – played over the **King's** and **Queen's courses**, which are



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frequently claimed to be **James Braid's** finest creations. And, the standard of service and cuisine at Gleneagles was exceptional throughout the event. Without doubt, the tournament will return here in the future, although the plan for 2007 is to re-visit Turnberry, where the event was born thirteen years ago.


Turnberry this year celebrates its centenary. The highlight of a busy year will be the Seniors' Open in July, where Tom Watson will be hoping to win again. A number of other events are planned throughout the season, and you can be sure the Westin group will want their Scottish flagship looking her best throughout the summer months.

Lovers of **County Kerry** and the **Killarney** area will be pleased to learn that the **Ross Hotel**, sister to the exceptional five-star **Killarney Park Hotel**, has reopened after total refurbishment by the **Treacy family**. This centrally located, boutique-style hostelry has 32 tasteful rooms and is competitively priced, as compared to other Killarney inns of its caliber.

In Southport, the Prince of Wales hotel has continued its refurbishment program, but we await with interest as there is development in the town of two new properties, in which their owners claim will meet demand at the top end of the market. No one could fault the Chester Grosvenor Hotel on quality; it is perhaps the best hotel in the north of England. Ideally located for Hoylake (Royal Liverpool) and Wallasey, it is also commutable to the courses of North Wales and day trips to Lytham or Southport are eminently possible. However, we never recommend repeated daily commutes to Southport, as traffic can be rather heavy.

Over the last few seasons, more and more of you have ventured to the English courses – Ganton,
Alwoodley, Woodhall Spa,
Hunstanton, Brancaster (Royal West Norfolk), and others dot the countryside between north and south. Of course, clusters in Kent (Royal St George's, Princes, & Royal Cinque Ports) and in Devon (Saunton Sands & Westward Ho!) can form the basis of enjoyable trips on their own.

Those who have not played **Wentworth, Sunningdale,** and







Walton Heath have every excuse to linger in the London area, where St George's Hill, Woking, and Swinley Forest will tempt you to extend your stay. Sightseers are spoilt for choice here, with London itself, Windsor, and Oxford all within easy reach, and the magnificent scenery of the Cotswolds is just an hour's drive away.

With Celtic Manor now confirmed as a future Ryder Cup venue, Wales may finally receive the publicity its courses deserve. We have repeatedly advocated the charms of Royal Porthcawl, Southerndown, Pennard, Royal St David's, Aberdovey, and others. Charming country house hotels abound and both accommodation and golf remain an exceptional value for the money. In addition, driving distances are modest and the scenery is uplifting. Gleneagles too will be an exceptional Ryder Cup venue, with play scheduled for the Centenary Course. For modern tournament professionals, the King's and Queen's courses are considered to be too short. However, some very talented amateurs who played in the Links Cup would confirm that both courses remain testing and enjoyable challenges for even the best of players - length is not everything!

Focus on Scotland

The Royal & Ancient GC announced that the 2009 Open Championship will be played on the Ailsa Course at the Westin Turnberry Resort from 16-19 July, the fourth time it has hosted the event since it was added to the championship rota. In 1977, it was the venue for the famous 'Duel in the Sun' between Tom Watson and Jack Nicklaus. The Open returned again in 1986, when Greg Norman was victorious, and 1994 when Nick **Price** snatched victory over the last few holes, memorably holing an outrageous putt on the 17th.

Since then the demands of the **Championship** have substantially increased, and while Turnberry could adequately cater in terms of space, there were major transport issues to overcome before the event could return. A new stretch of motorway between Glasgow and Kilmarnock has cut driving times and made any trip to Troon, Prestwick or **Turnberry** considerably easier. Essential changes and **improvements** have also been taking place on the Ailsa Course this winter. Of all the Championship venues, the Ailsa course has probably had the least-punitive bunkering. New bunkers and several new tees are being added and existing bunkers renovated. These changes will be completed for this year's Senior British Open Championship, which takes place from 27-30 July.

The Senior's event is now officially recognized by the R & A GC, the Champions Tour, and the European Seniors Tour as one of the five senior 'Majors'. Muirfield (or the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers) will play host in 2007. Nick Faldo, who won the 1987 and 1992 British Opens at the course, will turn 50 just before the championship next year and be eligible to enter, as will Seve Ballesteros. Royal Aberdeen was an extremely successful venue for the 2005 event, attracting many favorable comments from the top players, and was won by Tom Watson.

Still focusing on the west coast, we received positive feedback last year from clients who played the **Dundonald** course (formerly known as Southern Gailes). A new Scottish course designed by **Kyle Phillips**, the architect behind the much-





admired **Kingsbarns**. It was acquired by the exclusive **Loch Lomond Golf Club**, but is available again in 2006 for play by nonmembers, and has been talked about as a possible future venue for the **Scottish Open**.

The course offers some typical links



bunkering, gorse, undulating fairways, rolling greens, and a burn (stream) in play on 11 holes. Situated beside **Western Gailes** and **Kilmarnock (Barassie)**, its style has St Andrews Links Trust, the organization that runs the town's public courses, is creating a new 18-hole course to join its existing portfolio of six courses. It will be a 'pay as you play' course, open all year round and is hoped to be ready by 2007/2008. A wet spring in 2005

delayed early work on the layout, but fairways have now been shaped and seeded and are making progress. The Trust had actively sought to secure land for the building of a seventh course for some

time, citing the pressure of increased play over the past few years on the existing facilities – from both local golfers who live in or near the town and from

visitors.

This new

Dunes in Oregon, and was responsible for Queenswood near London and other courses in Hawaii, Ireland, Mallorca, and Nepal. Each hole will have a choice of five tees stretching its length from 5300-7200 yards.

When completed it will be the 6th

seaside layout in a nine-mile stretch between St Andrews and Crail – the others being the two courses at the St Andrews Bay Resort, Kingsbarns, and Crail (Balcomie & Craighead Links).

The Trust has also broken ground on a new **St Andrews Links Academy**, a major extension to the existing practice centre. **New outdoor** and **indoor bays** are being built, including **4 high-tech bays with video cameras** and **launch monitors** providing the latest digital analysis



and ball-tracking technology, and a separate area for **computer analysis of putting**. The new development will also incorporate an **external ball-testing centre**, for the Royal & Ancient GC and a **club-fitting facility**. The upgraded centre will be available for multiple uses, as either a simple warm-up facility, a tuition centre, or as a venue for group outings. **Completion is scheduled for April 2006**.

Having acquired the world-class **Old Course Hotel, Golf Resort & Spa** back in October 2004, the **US-based Kohler Co.** has been



pumping significant sums into an investment and improvement program. Kohler Co. began to develop its resort business in the USA with the restoration of **The American Club** in Wisconsin (1981). The Midwest's only AAA Five Diamond Resort hotel, the development also includes **Whistling Straits**, which hosted the **2004 PGA Championship**, won by **Vijay Singh**.

All bedrooms at the Old Course Hotel will have been updated this year, with some getting brand new beds and stylish new Kohler-fixture bathrooms. A sizeable extension to the Spa has also taken place. A bigger swimming pool, 12 new treatment rooms, and improved changing facilities & lockers have all been incorporated into the new layout, as well as an extended gymnasium and new aerobics studio. Meeting room and public areas, including all the corridors on the first three floors, are in the middle of a 2-year renovation program. Planning consent is being sought for a new glass-fronted function room on the 4th floor terrace, which may eventually host a



The **Duke's Course** – the resort's own championship layout overlooking St Andrews – has also felt the hand of change. Originally designed by 5-time Open Champion Peter Thomson, as many as ten holes have been altered (or in some cases completely redesigned) by the Pete Dye Company. Changes to the clubhouse and Pro Shop have also been undertaken, while the historic Craigtoun Mansion that sits in the extensive grounds is also being considered for renovation

For those reasonably familiar with St Andrews, the large redbricked university residence hall (Hamilton Hall) directly behind the 18th green of the Old Course has been sold to American developers. Once the last students leave this summer developers move in to convert one of the golfing world's best locations into an exclusive enclave of luxury residences for shared ownership, called the "St. Andrews Grand". Twenty-three 3 &

4-bedroom apartments will be built, ranging in size from 1,400 to 1,930 sq ft and with membership bonds costing from \$1,400,000 to \$3,500,000.

Originally the building was the Grand Hotel - completed in 1895.



Overlooking the Old Course, its sixstories of red Dumfries stone was a symbol of late 19th century wealth and luxury, and has provided an impressive backdrop since then. During World War II the hotel was transformed into a Royal Air Force training headquarters, and after the war it was acquired by the University of St. Andrews, converted into a dormitory for students and renamed. It also featured in the opening scenes of the film "Chariots of Fire".

Once renovations are complete, the St. Andrews Grand is planned to offer loft-style residences with sumptuous bedrooms, gourmet kitchens, and luxury bathrooms. A private Club Room, pub, spa facilities, concierge, and valet service are also planned. Memberships of Crail and Elie golf clubs are also proposed, with preferential rights on Kingsbarns Golf Links included as





well. The parent company recently secured a co-ownership interest on the latter golf course, which since its opening in 2000 has proved a huge success with visiting golfers to the area. Please contact us if you require more information about this new development.

On a smaller – but very welcome level, refurbishment of the 4-star Rusacks Hotel in St Andrews is also going ahead, with completion scheduled for April. The great location overlooking the 1st and 18th fairways of the Old Course deserves the investment, and we trust that clients will continue to enjoy its charms for many years to come.

In Edinburgh, the Caledonian Hotel (or the 'Caley' as it is popularly known locally), has raised its game significantly thanks to a \$15 million refurbishment, with more investment in the pipeline. Originally built in 1903, by the Caledonian Railway Company, the hotel is now part of the Hilton group. Situated in the heart of Scotland's capital city in the main shopping district, it looks across to the ancient Edinburgh Castle. Over 200 bedrooms have been renovated. as well as its restaurants, bars, and health club, in order to bring it back to it's former glory. At one point, in the Caledonian's history, steam from the trains in the adjacent railway station was recycled to heat the hotel's hot water supply - today's guests can expect more sophisticated comforts, including wireless broadband!

The historic Marine Hotel in North Berwick is being returned to its

former luxury status as well, courtesy of a multi-million pound investment by Macdonald Hotels & Resorts. Overlooking the historic North Berwick golf course and Firth of Forth, the hotel will be able to offer 83 refurbished rooms and suites (many with sea views), some one and two-bedroom apartments, conference facilities, and meeting rooms. In the same locality, the Open Arms hotel has also been adding more bedrooms and upgrading existing facilities. A smaller, more intimate alternative to The Marine, this charming hotel is situated in the village of Dirleton, only minutes from both North Berwick and Gullane.

Macdonald Hotels & Resorts have also built the newest championship course in Scotland - the Spey Valley GC at Aviemore in the Highlands. Due to open in Spring of this year, the course will feature one of the longest par 5s in the country at 641 yards, and superb views of the nearby Cairngorm Mountains from nearly every point on the course. Golfers may also have to contend with deer crossing fairways, or ospreys diving for fish in the small lochs! For those golfers interested in playing some of the smaller Scottish 'gems' as well, then nearby Boat of Garten, Kingussie, and Newtonmore complement this new addition. These courses can provide a convenient golf-stop for travelers heading north to Dornoch or, alternatively, pleasant day-trips from a base in Inverness or Nairn.

Latest Scottish news has advised that Billionaire property tycoon, Donald Trump, is evidently

planning to build a luxury golf destination in Scotland. He has always indicated a fondness of this historic golf country, as his mother, Mary MacLeod, was born on the **Isle of Lewis**. Although a site has not yet been identified, there are hints over a location in **Aberdeenshire** for an **exclusive housing development** and **golf course** to rival his sister US locations: **Trump National Golf Club** and **Briarcliff Manor**.

Finally, but staying in the greater Highlands, one of our favorite hotels – Dunain Park in Inverness – has been bought from the Nicoll family by the owners of the Royal Marine Hotel in Brora. We wish the Nicoll's well in their retirement and thank them for the hospitable and gracious way they've looked after our clients for many years.



All our readers will be familiar with St Andrews, but *Chester* may be an unknown quantity. In fact, the city has a famous history going back over 2,000 years to Roman times and is one of Europe's top heritage cities! It boasts a complete circuit of walls, sections of which date back to Roman times, as well as a Norman Cathedral and the famous Rows, unique two-tiered galleries built in the traditional black and white 'magpie' style, containing a wide range of shops selling goods from antiques to high fashion. In fact, Chester is one of the top retail centres in the UK, with large branches of national stores and attractive shopping malls.

Other attractions include the beautiful River Dee, the recently restored Grosvenor and Cheshire Military Museums, a Roman Amphitheatre, the beautiful Grosvenor Park and the city's famous Roodee Racecourse. There is also a zoo and, as luck would have it, a music festival, which conveniently takes place in July!

Royal Liverpool

The club was formed in June 1869 by James Muir Dowie, a Scot then living in Liverpool, and his father-in-law, Robert Chambers. Old Tom's brother George Morris laid out the first 9 hole course and his son, Jack, became the club's first professional. Jack was to remain at Hoylake for over sixty years!

For seven years, the links were shared with the Liverpool Hunt Club, which had a racecourse on the land. Now, just two reminders of that era remain: two ornamental pineapples from the old paddock gates adorn the putting green posts, and the old saddling bell now hangs in the clubhouse and is used as a dinner gong.

No stranger to hosting tournathe inaugural Home ments, Internationals (initially between Scotland and England) were held here in 1902, the first match between Britain and the United States (forerunner of the Walker Cup) in 1921, and the first English Close Championship in 1925. Numerous championships have been held since, including ten Open Championships sixteen and Amateur Championships.

Three Hoylake golfers dominated amateur golf in Britain for a generation around the early 1900's: John Ball, Harold Hilton, and Jack Graham. And the club has always enjoyed a tradition of style and friendship. It is claimed that the presentation by Kenneth Stoker, then Captain, of his red jacket to Bobby Jones in 1929 to mark his Grand Slam, was the inspiration for the Green Jacket at Augusta.

With housing to the left on the first few holes, the course initially has a slightly suburban feel. That impression subsides as you approach the turn, however, as the land becomes more undulating and impressive views of the Dee estuary and distant Welsh hills suggest a wildness far removed from the townscape left behind. Challenging short holes and classic par 4's are the order of the day, before a finish, which will produce a deserving champion in 2006. And that player will not have been fazed by the prospect of out-of-bounds posts, as Hoylake presents more opportunities to go OB than any other championship course in **England!**


